The Statistical Accounts of Scotland Online, revamped service

SAFHS members who have not had reason to visit the Statistical Accounts of Scotland Online service for a year or two may like to explore its new and improved website, launched in November 2016 it is well worth investigating, at <http://stataccscot.edina.ac.uk/static/statacc/dist/home>. It is a wonderful resource both for local history and thematic research.

The site uniquely hosts a complete digital collection of the late eighteenth - and early nineteenth-century Statistical Accounts of Scotland – rich and detailed parish reports for every parish in Scotland, offering a fascinating picture of local life at key points in Scottish history. Topics covered include agriculture, local history, education, trades, religion, folklore and social customs.

Along with a more attractive user interface, the front page now exhibits new feature articles on Sir John Sinclair; The *Old Statistical Account* 1791-99; the *New Statistical Account* 1834-45; Maps, Boundaries and the Historical Parishes; and the wider context of the Accounts. There is also a blog discussing topics connected with the accounts and their context, and how people use them in their research - <http://statacc.blogs.edina.ac.uk/>

Most significantly, the new search engine at the heart of the service makes available a range of new or improved features to subscribers. These features include:

- Enhanced search capacities across the Old (OSA) and New Statistical Accounts (NSA) and material such as appendices, images, and scholarly material
- The ability to limit a search to the OSA or NSA, and the ability to search by geographical area (N, NE, E, SE, S, SW, W, NW)
- Better display of search results which includes the context of each result
- New dedicated pages for each county and each parish
- New illustrations
- New, interactive, high resolution maps courtesy of the National Library of Scotland. The Thomson Map of Scotland (1832) has been incorporated into the site with all the parishes identified
- Improved quality of transcripts, available for most pages of the Statistical Accounts
- The ability to save, tag, annotate and share searches, in a personal user space
- A responsive user interface which works across desktop computers, laptops, tablets and phones.

Do check it out and contact the team if you have comments on the service – they are keen to hear feedback on their work. Wick Voices: Oral History meets Family History by Doreen Leith



Our recollections enrich the lives of those around us. They help the next generation to share our sense of belonging.

Wick Voices is Wick Society's Oral History Section and our aim is to collect stories from across the east of Caithness – although we have been known to stray beyond this area.

The Wick Voices project was launched in 2016 with the aim of preserving local voices for posterity.

The small team of volunteers, led by Doreen Leith, conducts audio interviews, with people from all walks of life talking about their memories and stories.

The recordings are edited and uploaded to the Wick Heritage website www.wickheritage.org allowing existing and future generations to hear about many aspects of local life, past and present, as told by those who have experienced it.

Subjects covered have ranged from schooldays to workplaces and from wartime experiences to sport and leisure.

As part of the Wick Society's outreach programme, Wick Voices delivers a range of talks and presentations throughout the County of Caithness and beyond, giving a flavour of the stories associated with different villages, farms and schools. During these presentations, different areas of Caithness are explored through playing audio clips, extracted from Wick Voices interviews and supported by photographs, mainly from the Johnston Photographic Collection.

Clan Davidson Family History Projects in Caithness and Beyond by Nick Hide

Nick Hide is one of the researchers for the Clan Davidson Association who is actively interested in researching all aspects of the Davidson family history. His own personal connection is with the Davidson of Tulloch family, a line that can be traced back to c1650 (so far). The family originally purchased Tulloch Castle, Dingwall from their cousins the Baine Family in c1760.



Nick's personal connection with Caithness comes from his ancestor William Davidson, a Notary in Cromarty who married in 1719 Jean Baine of Carsgoe, a farm just south of Thurso.

The Clan Davidson Association hold extensive genealogical archive records for many different Davidson families from different parts of Scotland, England and Ireland

The records of the Davidson families found in Caithness form an important part of our wide-ranging archive collection.

One of these families, whom we call the Davidson family of Buckies, is perhaps the oldest known family we have on file.

From Caithness to China by Neil Fraser

Neil Fraser intends his presentation to draw on digital material from within the archives of Historic Environment Scotland. They are particularly keen that researchers can access and use this material for both their own research and their enjoyment.



For example:

- Luftwaffe aerial reconnaissance images of the area.
- Engravings and plans of historic Caithness buildings.
- Aerial imagery charting the changes in Caithness communities over time.
- Historic mapping of the area through to the modern layering tools available through Canmore.
- Highlight local archaeology records on Canmore.
- Fantastic range of local social history material on Scran including lots of fishing relating records.
- Share the fantastic worldwide aerial image resources available from the National Collection of Aerial Photography – including China!
- ScotlandPlaces material relating to Caithness

Neil joined SCRAN in 2001 as part of their programme to help customers, both at home and abroad. In 2008 SCRAN became part of RCAHMS and there his role widened to engage with users of the likes of Canmore, ScotlandsPlaces and Britain from Above.

Nucleus: The Nuclear and Caithness Archive



Nucleus: The Nuclear and Caithness Archives are home to the archives of the UK civil nuclear industry and the historical archives of the county of Caithness.

UK Civil Nuclear Industry Records

The records of the nuclear industry date back over seventy years and include plans, drawings, photographs, film, microfiche and documents. These have previously been held at various sites across the UK including Dounreay in Caithness, Harwell in Oxfordshire, Trawsfynydd in Snowdonia, and Sellafield in Cumbria. The relocation to Wick will take several years to complete.

County of Caithness Archives

The archives of the county of Caithness date from 1589 to the present day and consist of documents in different formats including charters, minute books, correspondence, maps, photographs and plans. The records have previously been looked after at the Caithness Archive Centre, a service provided by High Life Highland on behalf of the Highland Council. These historic collections are now housed in Nucleus where they are available to members of the public for family and local history research.

We acknowledge the need to return in some respects to the old ways.

Before recognised genealogy courses existed, would-be genealogists were taken under the wing of a professional, who mentored and tutored in the skills of the profession and running a practice. This "apprenticeship" way of doing things ultimately brought about the foundation of ASGRA, which was and still is the only association of accredited genealogists in Scotland. Accreditation is much sought after, and we are pleased to have many genealogy diploma holders within our membership. ASGRA will be holding a recruitment day in September in Edinburgh, details to be published later.

ASGRA welcomes membership applications from all backgrounds and ages, however, and at all levels of skill and expertise, whether qualified or not - each application is assessed on its own merits, although some credit and exemption will be given to applicants holding an approved qualification. We are particularly interested in attracting new probationers, and direct all those interested to the Join Us section of our website www.asgra.co.uk

The Archive and Research Center will return to its Spring and Summer opening times as of 1st March 2019

Tuesday – Friday 10:00am to 4:00pm. Monday Evenings will continue to be by appointment only.

Membership of the Society continues to grow with approx. 30% under 60 years of age.

The part played by the Society in the 'Stobs Project' is gradually drawing to an end with all data being digitised and maintained both by the Society and the Archive Service at Hawick Hub.

The Society's Library continues to grow with a collection of over 2000 books with 21 new titles being added since the last bulletin. While some titles are kept as strictly reference works there are many titles available for members to borrow. Included with the library are the large collection of Monumental Inscriptions, police arrest records, poor law etc.

The Archive and Research Center has now been open for nearly 5 years and during opening ours we continue to work closely with members and non-members assisting in the tracking down of Border ancestors. During the period Oct 2018 to February 2019 we have welcomed 217 visitors; 182 locals, 22 from around the UK and 13 from overseas.

The Society will hold its AGM on the 28th May 2019 at St Peters Church, Galashiels when new officers of the society will be elected. Following on shortly after the AGM the society will have reached a milestone when we publish the 100th edition of the Society Magazine. (First published in 1985).

Caithness Family History Society is honoured to be the hosts of the 30th Annual Scottish Association of Family History Societies Conference. The Conference aims to bring together talks and experiences that will highlight the range and extent to which Caithness people have contributed to both our own ancestral heritage and where and how Caithness men and women have built families across the world.

The Conference will be officially opened by Viscount Thurso, Lord - Lieutenant of Caithness, himself the current head of the Sinclairs of Ulbster. The Sinclair Baronetcy of Ulbster was created in 1786 for Sir John Sinclair, politician, writer and instigator of the Statistical Accounts.

We are delighted to work with the Pulteney Centre in holding this event. Thanks go to their staff in making all of the Centre's wonderful facilities available. The Pulteney Centre was established as part of the Pulteneytown People's Project in 2003 with the aim of creating an environment that would offer opportunities to improve life chances and well-being for the citizens of Pulteneytown. Today the Pulteney Centre is a thriving community centre offering a range of activities and facilities.

Pulteneytown was laid out by Thomas Telford for the British Fisheries Society to provide housing and work in support of the developing herring fishing. Today, many of the original buildings can still be seen and a walk around the area will include references to Robert Louis Stevenson, James Bremner and the famous Old Pulteney Whisky Distillery

Local Population Studies Society

Dedicated to the study of local, social, and population history

The initial impetus for family history research is usually focused narrowly on particular ancestral lines, stimulated perhaps by the discovery of old family archives or photographs, the inquisitive questions from a child to a grandparent, or simply curiosity about personal ancestry. However, it is likely that personal family history research will quite quickly lead to other questions about the places in which people lived, their work and the communities in which they lived their lives, their migration from place to place and the typicality of ancestral experiences. Further investigation of such questions can often reveal that things which initially appeared surprising may be quite typical of the time and place in which they were situated. To answer such questions, it is necessary to move beyond family history and to engage with the local history of the locations and time periods that ancestors inhabited.

There are many routes to gaining the skills and information that can help to provide context to family history research, but many family historians have found that membership of the Local Population Studies Society (LPSS) provides a valuable point of entry and a useful resource for further enquiries that enable the experiences of ancestors to be located within a wider context. LPSS was founded in 1968, has just celebrated its 50th anniversary and has published issue 100 of the *Local Population Studies* Journal. The Society organizes two conferences each year, held in different parts of the country, and every year members receive two issues of *Local Population Studies* and two issues of the LPSS Newsletter.

The Society also provides a forum for discussion of relevant topics and guides to skills and sources for research into local population history.

The aims of the society are to link the interests and enthusiasms of individuals and groups working on the population history of their communities with each other, and with academic historians and demographers who can provide information on sources, skills and wider contexts. We encourage contributions from local historians, family historians and those working in academic institutions at all our conferences and publish papers of all types in both the newsletter and journal. To give a flavour of the topics we cover our Autumn 2018 conference (in Oxford) was on 'Historical sources and their use in local population studies', and our Spring 2019 conference in Sheffield on April 13th is on 'Urban mortality and graveyards'. Non-members are welcome to attend our conferences and conference registration for non-members automatically gives membership of the Society for one year, including digital access to the journal. 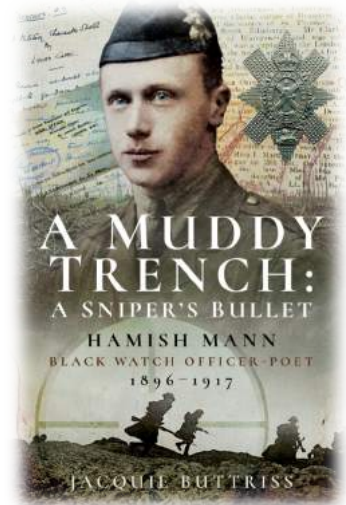

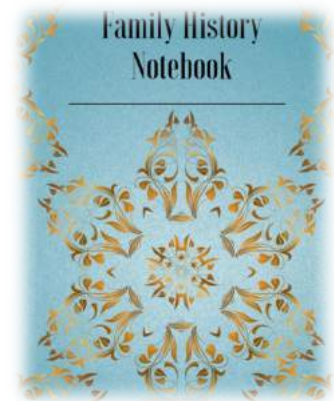

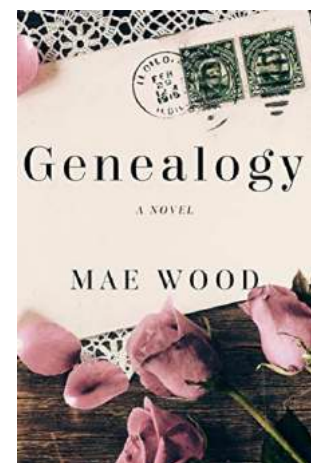
